My Father's Oldsmobile

In this day and age, it is almost impossible to comprehend the poverty that permeated the Eastern Kentucky Appalachians during the early part of the twentieth century. The Wall Street collapse affected every aspect of life in almost every corner of America. My father, Mr. Herman Adkins was born March 12, 1921 and lived his younger life in Jackson County Kentucky in the Gray Hawk area. One of twelve children born to Frank and Sarah Adkins, he dropped out of school in the seventh grade. Basically, he was living anywhere he could find a few days work. He worked in coal mines, the log woods, and did numerous farm labor projects to have a little money. He once told me that during this time of his life, he could live on 25 cents a day. He mostly roamed the roads hitchhiking from place to place. He would have been glad to hobo on the railroads, but there were no railroads to ride in Jackson County. This was a rough time for younger people everywhere, especially in Eastern Kentucky.

One day in 1937, he was walking through the small town of Richmond, Kentucky toward the edge of town to hitchhike a ride south. As he walked through town, he noticed that there was some activity in front of the Canfield Motor Company which was the Oldsmobile dealership. Upon arriving on foot, he observed that the news media was there taking pictures of a special new Oldsmobile convertible. Oh well, it was just another expensive project he knew he could never afford for himself. The car was owned by the dealer owner/manager and his family was there. Dad found himself attracted to the situation and the car. He walked around the car observing all the details. Starting at the left front of the car, he noticed the large chrome plated hubcap. He said he actually could see his teeth reflected in the finish of the fender which had a spare tire mounted in it. He noticed the long sturdy running board that led back to the rear fender. There was a unique tail light mounted just above the fender on

each side of the car. Rumble seats were common in those days. But this car had a rumble seat AND a trunk fitted behind the seat. The rear bumper had a medallion in the center that had a large "8" to designate the engine as an eight cylinder. Around the back of the car to the right side, he noticed another spare on the right front fender. He peered into the inside of the car. There was a wonderful three toned painted dash with chrome strips across the entire dash. The radio had a interesting design for the speaker grill in that it looked like miniature horizontal grill bars. Few cars had radios in those days and if they did, they were tuned to ONE station at the factory for a local station where the car was first sold. All the control knobs had a small chrome center that coordinated well with the shift lever which also had the chrome center. As he came back to the front of the car, he noticed the Cadillac-like checkerboard grille. He walked around that car two or three times drinking in all the details.

He noticed the happiness of the owner's family, the nice clothes they wore and the nice Stetson hat the owner wore.. The more he observed, the more fascinated he became. Later, as he stood watching the people, he thought to himself maybe if he worked hard that possibly he could have things like that car. That man worked and had a wife and family; he worked and owned a fine car; he worked and was successful. For the first time in his life, he looked at his future in a positive way. This was a life-altering experience in his life. He would talk later about how he almost skipped down the street after that encounter. There was hope where earlier it was mostly despair. There was a internal happiness that he had not had before in his life. This day had prompted some very mature thoughts of a wife and family in a relatively immature sixteen year old boy. He never forgot the family and car he had seen that day.

I had heard that story many times as he described the double deck lid convertible with dual side mount spares on the front fenders. Actually, we all heard so many times that it became a bit boring. As he told the story, it was very obvious that he

1937 Oldsmobile Convertible Coupe

- 1) Al's father bought this car in April 1970 after a very long search. This top-of-the-line Oldsmobile is known as the L-37 model because of its straight 8 engine. The paint color is known as Agate.
- 2) The car features a floor mounted 3–speed manual gearbox. The one–year only stylish dash features 2 large dials directly in front of the driver and a glovebox with a large round ashtray (on the left) and a rare optional clock.
- 3) The inline L-head (flat head) eight-cylinder engine (257 cubic inches or 4.2 liters) makes 110 horsepower at 3,600 rpms. It has a dual downdraft carburetor, 4–wheel hydraulic drum brakes, independent front suspension and leaf spring rear suspension. Wheelbase is 124 inches.
- **4)** An interesting feature of this convertible model was the rumble seat AND a separate trunk. This car was designed by a young Harley Earl.
- **5)** In 1937 Oldsmobile built just 728 of the L–Series Convertibles with only a reported 95 convertible models built with the dual enclosed sidemounts. Only 6 of this model are still known to exist. The Adkins love to drive this car as evidenced by the over 250,000 miles showing on the odometer.











had intentions of finding and buying a car like the one he saw in Richmond. As the years went by, Dad and us three sons were on the lookout for a six wheel L37 convertible coupe. And, after many years of watching, it became obvious that we were not going to find one. Some time in the mid to late sixties, my younger brother Wayne told me he had doubts about what our father 'thought' he saw. Wayne had traveled up north where he had access to a good library. After only a short time, he determined why we could not find another car. It turns out that only ninety-eight of these cars were produced and three of them were shipped abroad to England. Also, during about this same time period a magazine called Special Interest Autos featured 1937 **Oldsmobiles** and confirmed the low production of this car. We were looking for a needle in a haystack. At that point, we basically forgot about finding the 1937 Oldsmobile eight cylinder convertible.

On a Saturday in early 1970, I was driving through Lexington, Kentucky along the north side of the University of Kentucky on Maxwell street. The traffic stopped abruptly and I happened to look to my right. Of all things, there was parked a maroon **1937 Oldsmobile** double deck lid convertible with dual side mounts. My pickup truck almost parked itself and I walked back to the car just as its owner, a UK student, was coming out of a restaurant. We talked shortly about the car. He was looking for some few parts and was having little luck. I assured him that the parts were available at my Father's salvage yard as he had been collecting this year parts for some time. He and I made plans to travel to McKee, KY to my father's place and procure the parts needed for the old car. That day was a bad traveling day as it was pouring rain. After procuring the parts, we got in the truck to return back to the Bluegrass and home. As we were about to drive out on the road, he asked Dad if he would be interested in buying the **1937 Oldsmobile convertible**. Dad's reply was interesting. He did not want to appear too interested. But that day, the young student agreed to contact Dad if he wanted to sell the car.

After several conversations, my father was able to procure the car as the young owner was dedicated to an out-of-the-country project that would have

him away for several years. One day in late spring of 1970, the college student and his car showed up at my parents house. He had determined that due to my father's dedication to this particular car, that he wanted my father to own and care for his old car. A price was mentioned at which time my father quickly wrote a check. My mother used to laugh and tell that was the only time ever that Dad took the seller up on the first price.

It turns out the car was technically owned by a lady in Leola, Pennsylvania who was an older sister to the student. We, therefore know the car spent at least the 1960's in Pennsylvania. From 1970 it has been in the Adkins family. When my father passed on in June 2004, it was his wishes for his oldest son, your humble writer, to have the car. It would be good to point out that the next son got a really nice (near perfect) 1931 Ford Model A sport roadster which was one of Dad's favorite cars also. Our youngest brother Wayne passed on some years ago and his sons were willed a really nice 1951 Cadillac and another 1937 Oldsmobile sedan.

The maroon 1937, 6-wheel convertible coupe, 8-cylinder Olds resided in my garage out behind my house for five years while I went through several surgeries. In 2010, with the help of some really good friends, I started the process of refurbishing the old car. The car has been repainted a factory color that was eyeball matched to color "Agate". I determined that it was a little too red to suit me and we added green to kill the red. The color can only be described as "milk chocolate" and it looks great to me. It is not flashy and could easily be described as a bit mundane in color. That is fine with me as Dad would like the color choice. The frame has undergone a complete refurbish and repaint with the front suspension being completely rebuilt. The engine was rebuilt before it was put back into the car. There are several other items including a total interior and a new convertible top were installed.

The car title is in my name and the car is parked at my shop behind my house. But, it will forever and always be "MY FATHER'S OLDSMOBILE".
